About First Mardi Gras Inc.

First Mardi Gras Inc. is a not for profit community organisation for 78ers.

First Mardi Gras was formed in April 2017 to initially support participation by and engagement with a broad range of 78ers in the lead up to the 40th Anniversary of Mardi Gras in 2018. Since the anniversary, First Mardi Gras has focused on staging events of interest to 78ers as well as the broader community. Our organisation aims to ensure representation of 78ers through democratic processes including election of the Management Committee by members.

The operations of the organisation are governed by our Constitution and the Associations Incorporation Act, 2009. The objectives of First Mardi Gras Inc. are to:

Celebrate our history

- Raise awareness of the role of 78ers as the foundation generation of Mardi Gras.
- Educate the broader community on the many years of LGBTIQ history that followed the first Mardi Gras.

Inspire our community

- Inspire younger LGBTIQ Australians to take collective action about the issues they care about.
- Showcase the progress on LGBTIQ rights made in NSW and across Australia in a way that can be replicated across our global community.

- As an ageing community, advocate for appropriate support and services.

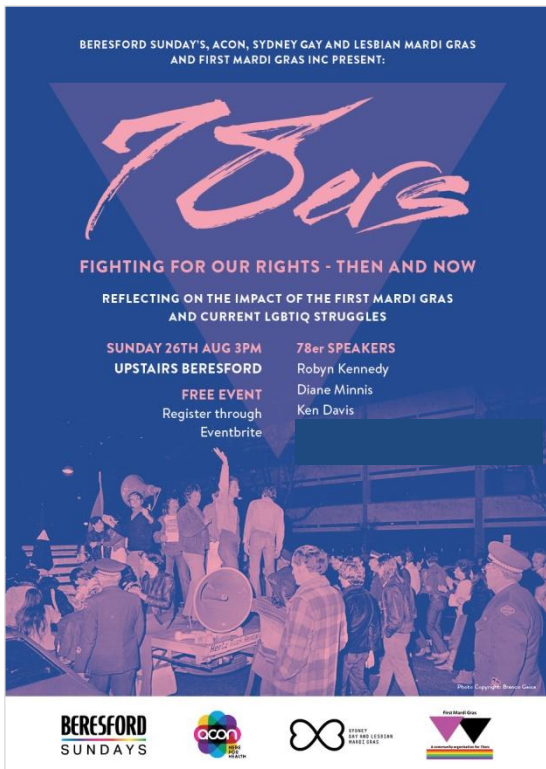
Highlights

After commemorating the 40th Anniversary of the first Mardi Gras last year, our community organisation for 78ers has had a less hectic year in 2018-19. Even so, we have some significant milestones to celebrate over the last 12 months.

On 9 August 2018 NSW Police Commissioner Michael Fuller gave an official apology of behalf of the Police Force for the actions of police during the events of 1978.

Our major new initiative this year, our *Salon78* forums, to celebrate the upsurge of activism – both political and cultural – that followed the first Mardi Gras and reflect on current LGBTIQ struggles. We thank Beresford Sundays for their support in hosting these events: *Fighting for Our Rights - Then and Now; Out and Loud - The Gay Liberation Quire 1981-87* and *Rainbow Immigration and Refugees*.

78ers staffed the large Fair Day tent on 17 February 2019 and distributed 78ers t-shirts provided by Mardi Gras. A number of people, particularly young folk, came to talk to us about our history.

Our fundraising Trivia Night returned on 20 February 2019 and this year we thank the fabulous Bonnie Bocamp (Paul Van Reyk) and Alisar Gazal for hosting with wit and style.

A few days before the Parade, on 27 February 2019, we hosted *Reunion41* at the Columbian. This was a relaxed social gathering for 78ers, their partners and friends with music and humour from Mother Inferior of the Order of Perpetual Indulgence (Fabian LoShiavo) and David Abello.

Then on 2 March 2019, the big one – 78ers marched in the Mardi Gras Parade! We had over a hundred 78ers, partners and friends in our walking contingent and on the bus. Ken Davis was interviewed during the SBS coverage of the Parade.

78ers really appreciated our fabulous t-shirts provided by Mardi Gras. And thanks also to the SGLMG 78ers Committee for their organisation of the 78ers Parade contingent.

Following straight on from the Mardi Gras season were two regional Mardi Gras in March 2019. 78ers travelled to march in the Wagga Wagga Mardi Gras (9 March 2019) and the Hay Mardi Gras (30 March 2019). Kudos to Helen Gollan for

encouraging participation in these events, which raise the visibility of regional LGBTIQ communities.

In late March we started a series of Social Dinners at pubs and clubs so 78ers could socialise over a meal at a reasonable price. Thanks to Rebell Barnes and Gary Case for organising these events.

Then in late June 2019, a number of 78ers travelled to New York to join in WorldPride celebrations which marked 50 years since the Stonewall uprising.

This year again we had quite a number of requests for interviews from students and the media as well as invitations to speak at events.

We appreciate the support of a wide range of 78ers, their partners and friends as members and at our events over the year.

We acknowledge our wonderful Committee members: Betty Hounslow, Ken Davis, Sandra Gobbo and Garry Wotherspoon who were elected at last year's AGM. Robyn Kennedy was re-elected as Secretary/Treasurer at the AGM but resigned in September given the demands of her role on the Mardi Gras Board. Robyn's tireless work on our 40th Anniversary events and her contribution to the establishment of First Mardi Gras Inc. are to be applauded.

We commend Sandra Gobbo for stepping into the Secretary's role, driving usability improvements to our email system and website and for her frequent social media contributions.

We also thank Fiona Hulme, who was co-opted as Treasurer in October 2018 and Richard Thode who was appointed to that role after Fiona's resignation in March 2019.

We look forward to more fun, celebrations and activities for 78ers and First Mardi Gras Inc. in the coming years.

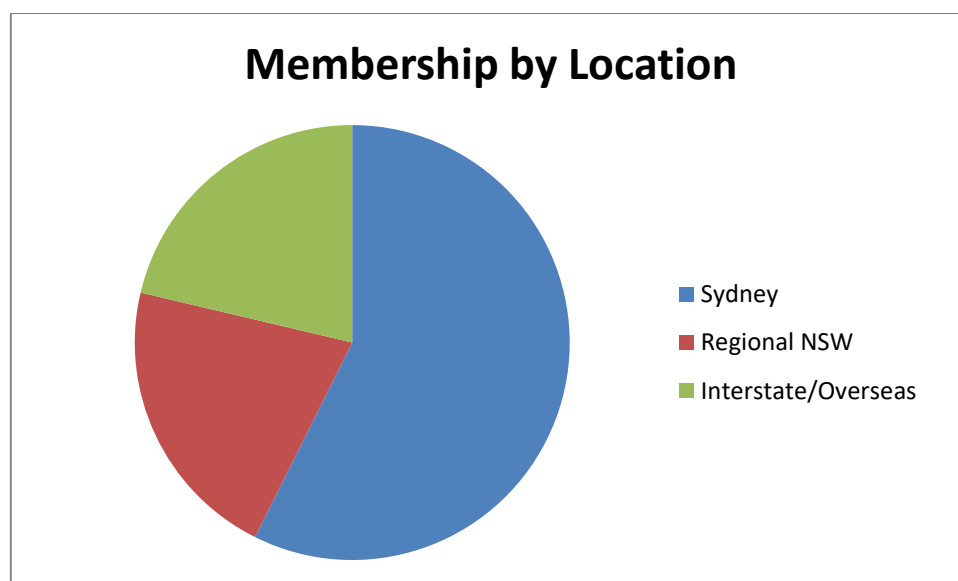
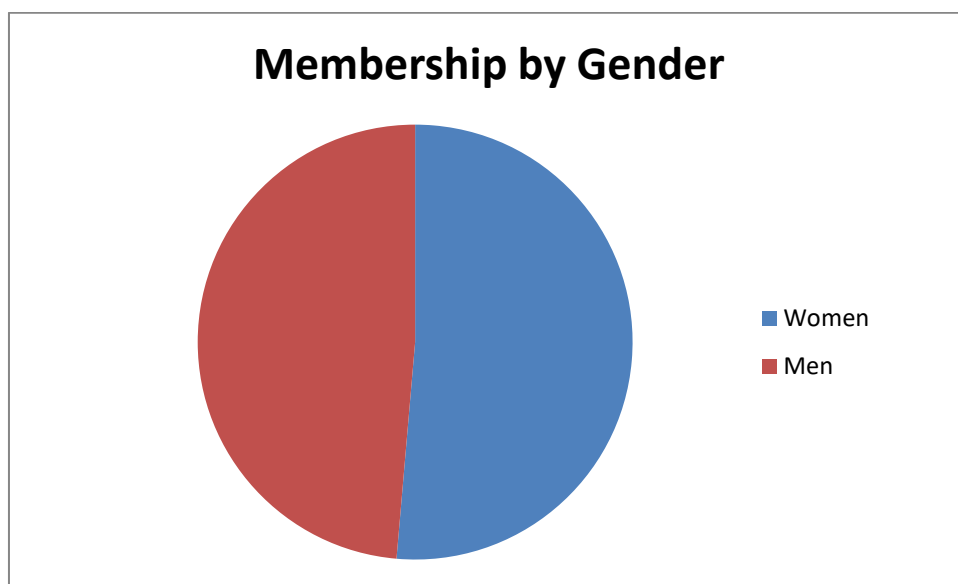

First Mardi Gras Inc. Membership

By the end of June 2019, 183 people had joined First Mardi Gras Inc. One hundred and sixty seven joined as 78er Members and 17 are Associate Members who are not 78ers.

Our membership is still almost half and half women and men, with 94 (51.4%) women and 89 men (48.6%). Overall, 105 (57.4%) First Mardi Gras Inc. members live in Sydney, 39 members (21.3%) live in regional NSW and 39 (21.3%) live interstate or overseas.



NSW Police Apology

On 9 August 2018 NSW Police Commissioner Michael Fuller gave an official apology of behalf of the Police Force for the actions of police during the events of 1978.

In addition to an unreserved apology, Commissioner Fuller committed the Police Force to never repeating the abuse suffered by 78ers. "As the New South Wales Police Force Commissioner, I am truly sorry for the way that you, the LGBTQI community, was treated back in '78. The actions of police – and society – and the laws behind them at the time were wrong."

In 2016 a public apology was made by the NSW Parliament and also by the Sydney Morning Herald. In early 2018 the NSW Police Spokesman for Sexuality and Gender Diversity delivered an apology, but 78ers were keen to have it directly from the NSW Police Commissioner. Peter Murphy pursued this.

Sue Fletcher said: "In terms of the events of 1978... and what an apology could mean to me, maybe the police and our community could work together to implement a safe schools program."



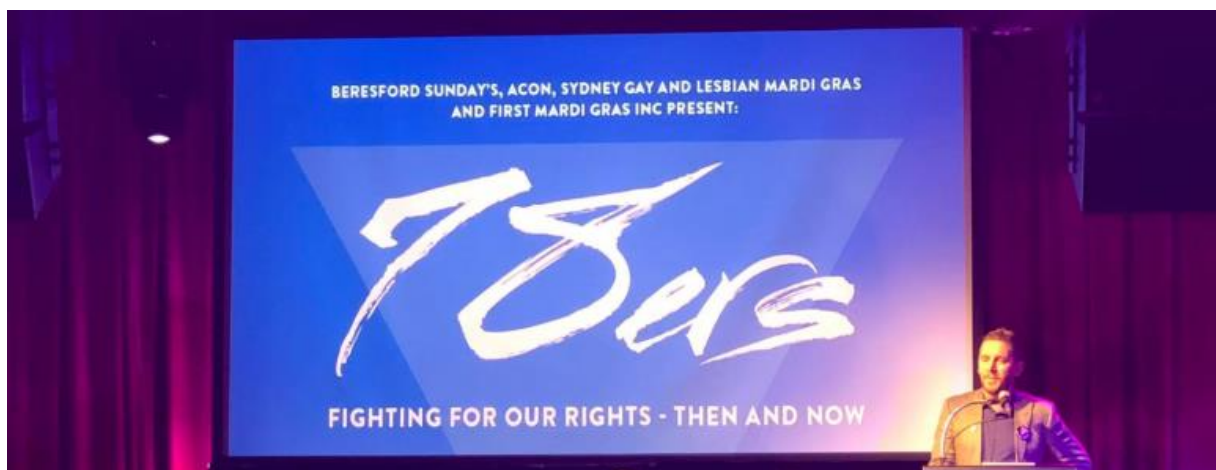

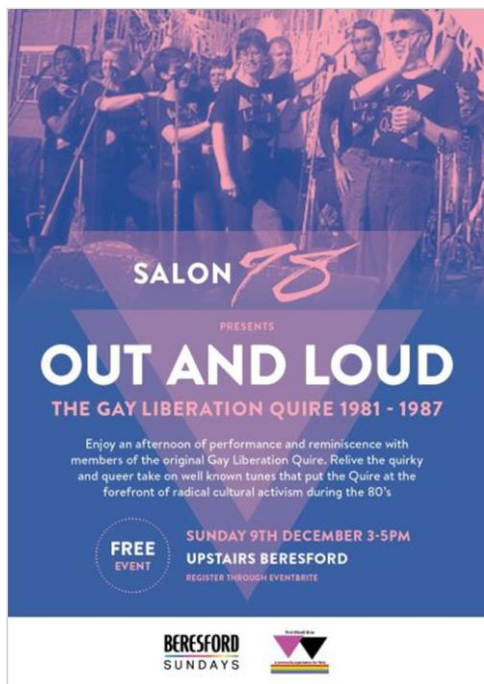
- Robyn Kennedy, on the social and political context of the early gay and lesbian movements.

Ken Davis gave us a global overview on the factors affecting LGBTIQ Refugees overseas.



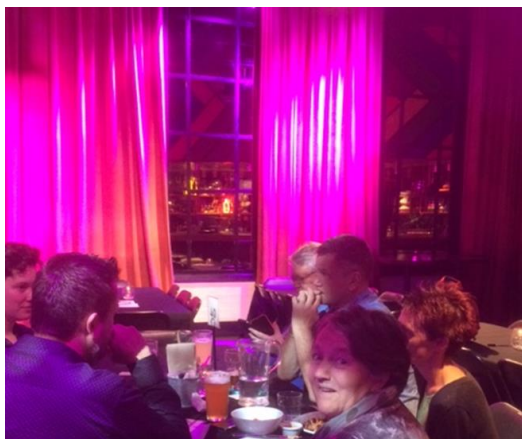
Trivia Night

On Sunday 30 June, twenty five 78ers, with partners, family and friends led the 200-strong Sydney Gay and Lesbian Mardi Gras march contingent. It was huge and went for nearly 12 hours, with 100,000 marchers and 3.5 million spectators!

Financial Report 2019

First Mardi Gras Inc. ABN 23 393 628 948

For the year ended 30 June 2019

Summary

Last year was the 40th Anniversary Year of the first Sydney Gay and Lesbian Mardi Gras and therefore a year of great significance and activity for our membership. Unsurprisingly, the current year was a little quieter in regard to both income and expenditure.

A bit over half our revenue (\$2,280) came from membership renewals and donations. The rest was from events and includes income from the 40th Anniversary event on 24 June 2018 which was not banked until July (\$706.50).

Your Committee is delighted that during Financial Year 2018-2019 many First Mardi Gras Inc. members chose to renew for multiple years. This will of course mean reduced membership receipts in FY 2019-2020 and beyond unless we are able to increase the number of Associate and Organisational Members. Membership numbers are reported elsewhere in the Annual Report.

Expenditures were largely operational (accounting, advertising, printing, web-related) plus venue hire and catering.

Since the end of FY 2018-2019 the Committee has decided that the cost of accounting software is not justified by our current level of financial activity and we therefore cancelled our subscription for Xero Accounting Software. This will save First Mardi Gras Inc. around \$600 per year.

Vale

We remember two 78ers who passed away during the year: Ron Austin and Peter Madden.

Ron Austin passed away on the morning of 13 April 2019, only a month after his 90th birthday. He was an early member of CAMP Inc., especially of the Political Action Committee and a supportive counsellor on the Phone a Friend service. Ron recognised the need to involve non-political LGBTIQ people in the campaign for equality – so he suggested the evening street party which became the first Mardi Gras. Ron was later an active and wise voice in the Pride History Group.

Peter Madden, or Maddo from Paddo, passed away on 30 June 2019 – a few months before his 80th birthday. Maddo was a community pharmacist on Oxford Street from 1967 to 2005. He promoted safe sex, supported the early transitions of transgender people, made home visits when the HIV epidemic was at its peak and prepared small doses and skin creams to assist LGBTIQ people in palliative care. Maddo also participated with his family in the protests after the first Mardi Gras.
